Day 00

Arrival in Srinagar | Welcome to the Valley of Paradise

Your adventure begins the moment you land in Srinagar, the enchanting summer capital of Jammu & Kashmir, cradled by the snow-dusted Zabarwan Mountains.

Transfer to your Hotel & explore the legendary Dal Lake on your own

Spend the afternoon at your own pace wandering the lively bazaars of Lal Chowk, sampling Kashmiri kangri bread and Kehwa tea, or simply watching the golden hour paint the Himalayan skyline.

In the evening, gather for a pre-ride orientation with your Team Captain — gear checks, route briefing, and the first of many campfire conversations with fellow riders.

□ Day 01

Srinagar to Kargil Crossing the Great Himalayan Divide

After a hearty breakfast, throttle up and leave the valley behind as you begin the climb into high Ladakh.

The first landmark is Sonamarg — the Meadow of Gold — a sweeping alpine corridor that once served as a waypoint on the ancient Silk Road.

The real test arrives at Zojila Pass (3,528 m): a narrow, nerve-jangling serpentine of a road that marks the boundary between Kashmir's lush greenscapes and Ladakh's stark, lunar world. Conquer it, and Ladakh is yours.

Beyond Zojila, the landscape bleaches to shades of ochre and rust as you roll through Drass — one of the coldest permanently inhabited towns on the planet and the silent gateway into the Land of High Passes.

Arrive in Kargil, a resilient frontier town with a proud history, check into your hotel, share stories over dinner, and rest up for the road ahead.

Day 02

Kargil to Leh Passes, Monasteries & River Confluences

The ride from Kargil to Leh is a Himalayan greatest-hits: two formidable high-altitude passes, a moon-landscaped monastery town, a sacred river confluence, and an enigmatic magnetic anomaly — all in a single day.

First, crest Namika La (3,700 m), where panoramic ridgelines stretch in every direction, followed by Fotu La (4,108 m), the highest point on this stretch and a natural vantage point over ancient trade routes.

A short detour takes you to Lamayuru Monastery, perched above an eerily beautiful lunar valley. Monks, prayer flags, and a thousand-year-old silence await.

At Sangam Point, watch the turquoise Zaskar River surrender itself to the grey-green Indus in a swirling, photogenic confluence. Pause at Magnetic Hill, where an optical illusion makes it appear your bike is rolling uphill with the engine off — a roadside marvel that never gets old.

Pay your respects at Pathar Sahib Gurudwara, built around a sacred boulder bearing the imprints of Guru Nanak Dev Ji, before rolling into Leh — the capital of the world's highest plateau.

□ Day 03

Leh to NubraValley | Over the Roof of the World

Begin the day with a sunrise visit to Shanti Stupa, the white-domed Buddhist monument that offers the finest panoramic view of Leh and its guardian peaks.

Then brace yourself: you're about to ride over Khardung La (5,359 m), one of the world's highest motorable mountain passes. The air is thin, the views are infinite, and the bragging rights are permanent.

Descend into the Shyok River valley and wind north to Diskit, where a 106-foot Maitreya Buddha statue gazes serenely across the arid plain — a humbling landmark that few tourists ever forget.

Continue to the Hunder Sand Dunes, a surreal cold-desert moonscape where double-humped Bactrian camels — descendants of ancient Silk Road caravans — still roam freely. Take an optional camel ride or ATV run across the dunes (own expense).

Check into your riverside camp as the stars emerge over the Karakoram Range — one of the most spectacular natural light shows in Asia.

Day 04

Nubra Valley to Pangong Tso | Riding Into Infinite Blue

Set off through the Shyok River corridor, passing the orchard-filled villages of Agam and Shyok, whose apricot trees and mud-brick walls seem lifted from another century.

The first glimpse of Pangong Tso is a moment riders describe for the rest of their lives: a sliver of impossible blue materialising between barren ridges, growing wider and more vivid with every metre of descent.

Pangong Tso stretches 136 km across the India-China border, sitting at 4,300 m above sea level — the world's highest saltwater lake. Its waters cycle through every shade of blue and green depending on the light, the season, and the angle of the sun.

Spend the afternoon lakeside — stroll the shoreline, photograph the mirrored mountains, or simply sit in the silence that only high-altitude wilderness can offer.

Overnight in a lakeside camp, where the sound of waves against the pebbled shore will lull you to sleep.

Stay: Pangong Lake

Day 05

Pangong to Hanle | Honouring the Fallen at Rezang La

Depart the lake with the morning light still cold and golden, and ride south through the remote Chushul valley.

The most poignant stop of the journey awaits at Rezang La War Memorial — a windswept monument to the 114 soldiers of the 13th Battalion, Kumaon Regiment, who made the ultimate sacrifice defending Indian territory during the 1962 Sino-Indian War.

Stand here in silence; the weight of history is palpable.

Cross the Loma Bridge over the Indus River and press deeper into the Changthang plateau — one of the most remote and least-visited corners of India.

Arrive by evening in Hanle, a tiny village at 4,500 m that feels like the edge of the known world. Check into your homestay, eat a warm home-cooked dinner, and sleep under skies so clear you can count the rings of Saturn.

Stay: Hanle

Day 06

Umlingla Pass Excursion & Demchok | Summit of the Motorable World

This is the day every rider on this tour will talk about forever. You are about to climb Umlingla Pass — at 5,640 metres, the highest motorable road on Earth, standing taller than Everest Base Camp.

En route, cross Photi La (5,524 m), itself a formidable altitude, before the final push to the summit. The landscape here is stripped to its bare bones: rock, sky, prayer flags, and an overwhelming sense of achievement.

Umlingla marks the source of the Umlung Stream, a tributary that eventually drains into the mighty Indus. Few rivers begin their journey this high.

On the descent, cross Nurbu La (5,282 m) — your third pass above 5,200 m in a single day — before returning to Hanle for lunch.

If the afternoon allows, visit Hanle Observatory, the highest space research station in India, where astronomers peer into the cosmos through crystalline skies untouched by light pollution.

Stay: Hanle

Day 07

Hanle to Leh | The Long Road Home Through Changthang

Rise before dawn to catch the sunrise over the Ladakh Range — a slow explosion of amber and rose that you will carry in your memory long after the trip ends.

The ride back to Leh traces the Indus valley through the spa-town of Chumathang (famous for its hot springs), past the historic villages of Upshi, Karu, and the imposing Thikse Monastery, before the road widens into the Leh valley.

Check into your Leh hotel, scrub the road dust off, and spend the evening free in Leh's spirited market — browse Tibetan jewellery, sip butter tea at a rooftop café, or sample the legendary Ladakhi momos.

Day 08

Leh to Sarchu | Farewell to Ladakh

After breakfast, point the handlebars south and begin the long, magnificent goodbye to Ladakh.

The route climbs over three successive passes — Nakee La, Lachung La, and the mighty Tanglang La (5,328 m) — each one a grand finale in its own right.

At Tanglang La, pause to absorb the staggering views across the Rupshu plateau before the road tips steeply into Himachal Pradesh and the character of the terrain shifts from Tibetan austerity to the deeper greens of the inner Himalayas.

Arrive at Sarchu — a seasonal tent village at 4,200 m perched on the banks of the Tsarap River — hand your bike keys to the Road Captain, and settle into your Swiss Camp for a well-earned night's rest.

Stay: Sarchu (Swiss Camps)

Day 09

Sarchu to Kullu-Manali | Into the Valley of the Gods

The last full day in the saddle. After an early breakfast, depart Sarchu as the camp stirs to life around you.

The route is raw in places — loose gravel, river crossings, and the infamous Gata Loops test your riding composure one final time — but the payoff is extraordinary as the road drops into the lush Kullu Valley.

The scent of deodar cedar and the sight of apple orchards signal your arrival in Manali, a mountain town vibrating with colour, culture, and the relieved joy of expedition's end.

Deposit your bike keys with the Road Captain. Tonight, celebrate with your crew — the bond forged across 12 days and 2,000+ kilometres of some of the world's most extraordinary roads.

Stay: Kullu-Manali

Day 10

Manali to Delhi | The Journey Becomes Memory

Check out of the hotel by 10 AM and let the morning be easy — café visits, souvenir shopping, final group photographs in front of the Rohtang backdrop.

As the afternoon fades to evening, board your overnight Volvo bus for Delhi.

The mountains shrink in the rear window, but the friendships forged on these roads will travel with you far longer.

An overnight Volvo bus journey is included.

You arrive in Delhi in the early morning, carrying 12 days of memories: the thin air of Umlingla, the silence of Hanle's night sky, the absurd blue of Pangong Tso, and the warmth of every shared meal along the way.

- Guests are required to assemble at the meeting point by 8:00 AM sharp

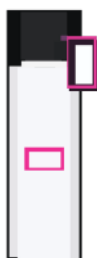
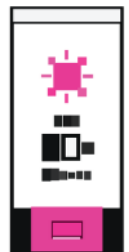
